How Can I Keep From Singing? MUSIC SUNDAY

The choirs will present an all-music program for worship under the direction of our Director of Music, Vicki Masters. The service will include the Children's Choir, the Youth Ensemble, the Chalice Singers, and the Sanctuary Choir.

In addition to being TVUUC's Director of Lifespan Religious Education, Brian Griffin is the author of published poetry and short fiction in Shenandoah and other literary journals, and the New York Times compared his collection *Sparkman in the Sky* to Hemingway's early work. Brian studied under the famous Southern novelist Peter Taylor in Memphis, earned an MFA in Fiction Writing at the University of Virginia, and was Writer In Residence at UTK. He serves on the board of the Knoxville Writers' Guild and manages the Peter Taylor Prize for the Novel. Brian has agreed to read some of his poetry and fiction and to talk about the link (which he considers to be deeply spiritual) between his literary work and his service to religious education at TVUUC.

Kellogg Foundation developed this new mission statement, “In ten years, what is now a crisis for children will have been transformed to a national priority and a moral commitment.” Why are they making this commitment? What are the issues? Is there a crisis here? Let us reflect on the realities and find direction.

Forum at 11:15 AM—“Biofuels (Part 1 of 2): Fuelishness or Bioproportunity?”

Originally from Peru, Prof. Daniel De La Torre Ugarte is UT Associate Professor of Agricultural Economics and Associate Director of UT's Agricultural Policy Analysis Center (APAC). He works on the synergism between agricultural and energy policies, their international impacts, and the consequences of trade liberalization, and he helped write the “25X’25 study” which determined that American agriculture could provide 25 percent of our total energy needs while continuing to produce affordable food, feed, and fiber. But biofuels—primarily ethanol and biodiesel—are hotly controversial, and a differing view—Biofuels (Part 2 of 2)—will be presented on June 29 by Dr. Henry Fribourg, UT Professor Emeritus of Forage Crops Ecology.

At Last—The New Library at TVUUC!

The next time you are at TVUUC, take a look at our new library, now under construction in the "Hall Room"—you know, that room off the hall that used to be the RE office. The task force (Ginna Mashburn, Greg McKendry, Dick Trowbridge and Jenny Arthur) consulted with our librarians, Jeff Gordon and Sherry Kasper, to turn this narrow room into our own little "stacks."

This project has literally been years in the making. When the Preschool Cooperative moved out a few years ago, we relocated the RE office to gain a much-needed meeting room. Note, however, that this will be a "meeting room of last resort" so that it can operate as a library, available to anyone who'd like to peruse the books or sit down for a casual conversation or a small, interruptable meeting. There are custom-built bookcases (designed and built by Dick Trowbridge) and new carpeting, paid for by donations to the Memorial Fund. As the library starts to function, you'll hear more from our librarians about what books are needed and how to use the library.

Is TVUUC in a Recession?

As you know, the Board of Directors rescheduled the Congregational Meeting because there were so many unknowns regarding the outcome of canvass.

Now, with more results in, it appears that the news is not good. While we have had generous increases and some terrific new pledges—a gain of \$29,651 (6%)—and 125 households have renewed at the same level, many households are feeling the effects of the economic decline and have had to reduce their pledges. A significant number are managing personal or medical crises of various kinds. In all, as of this writing, we have \$46,936 (9.4%) in confirmed reductions, as well as \$48,733 (10.2%) which are still unknown.

Are the Blount County pledges the problem? We are grateful for the past support of our members who are starting up the new church in Blount County. In terms of our overall budget, the pledges from members who are now at Blount account for a *small percentage* of current TVUUC pledges—at present, \$9,360, or less than 2%. Most of the attendees in Blount County are *new* Unitarian Universalists; only a handful are from our current pledge base. We wish them the best as they build on this core group and generate more resources for liberal religion in East Tennessee. But they are not the reason for the shortfall here.

We have heard reports from other churches around town and from other UU churches around the country that they, too, are feeling an impact from the economic decline.

Your Board and Canvass Committee will continue to work hard to bring in the remaining pledges, and the Finance Committee will be working on various budget scenarios in anticipation of our June 15 congregational meeting. 

Certain moments seem like the end of something and the beginning of something else. Now is one of those moments for me as Director of Lifespan Religious Education.

When I came into this role as Acting DLRE in October, I took an existing program and attempted to keep it running, making it better where I could and “holding the line” elsewhere.

Then, when I accepted the “permanent” position in January, I found myself sprinting toward May, as though the end of the academic year were somehow the finish line of a race I was running against myself.

All in all, the past few months have been, for me, quite an education. I can only hope that someone besides has been educated since I have been here.

If things have gone well since October, it was for one simple reason: dedicated volunteers. The worship services on the past two Sundays were loaded with gratitude as we recognized RE teachers on May 11 and as we celebrated the fruits of their work in the Bridging Ceremonies on May 18. These were celebrations of community, statements of hope for the future of Religious Education at TVUUC – and something we can’t take for granted.

I am still charting new territory for myself: I am running a summer program for the first time; I am working to choose curricula and to build a new teaching staff for the first time; I am working to rebuild the Adult RE Committee and to create a new slate of Adult RE classes for the fall. SUMMER SUNDAY SCHOOL



WATTS happening?? In an effort to help members and friends figure out how much energy their home appliances are using, the Environmental Committee purchased two Watt Meters to loan out for one week periods. So far, to my knowledge, no takers!

Please let us know what you need to use these to advantage – personal demonstration, workshop/forum, or written procedure. Or, just see Nina Lee in the office to sign up for your Watt Meter.

CFL disposal – please use the disposal container provided in the office for CFLs no longer functioning.

We are a member of the Knoxville Recycling Coalition (KRC), which allows us to recycle paper, cell phones, ink cartridges, and computers at their office on Sutherland Ave. KRC provides the very helpful Recycling Guide annually, which we have distributed at TVUUC.

Last month, we received a written response from TVA to our inquiry in your behalf about Green Power Switch. TVA promises more info on the GPS website and they assure us that all funds paid for GPS power blocks are invested in renewable generation. Please let me know if you want a copy of the letter.

Green Sanctuary Program is now an official part of UUA! After years of Affiliate status, relying on volunteers stretched thin by the large number of congregations signing up to participate in the Program, the GSP will now be managed by the UUA national office. SOME STRANGE IDEAS ABOUT JESUS

Recently, a couple who had moved here from a faraway city stopped in to check us out. They had been visiting a few churches on Kingston Pike, and at one of them they had learned that we, Tennessee Valley UU Church, had some “strange ideas about Jesus.” Now, that got me to thinking, “What could they mean by that?”

Not that I hadn’t heard about some “strange” UU ideas myself. Long ago, way back before I even thought of becoming a Unitarian Universalist, someone told me that the patron saint of the UU church was Ralph Waldo Emerson. Since I was raised Catholic, I was pretty familiar with saints—those holy, holy people who get to sit near the seat of the Most High for all Eternity. Emerson didn’t seem to fit the bill. Now that I’ve been around a while, I’ve got to ask myself: Why wouldn’t the Most High want such a delightfully provocative dinner companion?

Coincidentally, on the way in to work this morning, I was listening to John Prine’s Jesus—the Missing Years. It’s an outrageously funny exploration of what might have happened to Jesus in the years between the age of twelve and thirty. He gets married, has a baby (even deals with baby “poop”), gets arrested, lives among a group of wild, rootless young people and, presumably, consorts with other “sinners.” In Prine’s fantasy, Jesus is a man who lives life the way many of us have lived it, even if ever so briefly, in our youth.

If some of us have “strange” ideas about Jesus, maybe it’s because we believe that real life experiences might have been at least partially responsible for making him the great moral

teacher that he was. Maybe tolerance, justice, mercy, love, the search for truth and meaning and a belief in the inherent worth and dignity of every human being doesn’t come to a person from “out of the blue.” Maybe it comes from living, from experiencing, from embracing life, then reflecting upon our experiences.

We are a church that embraces all kinds of ideas, all kinds of people. We welcome a very wide range of ideas—even ideas about Jesus. Or Emerson. Or John Prine.

No attending member can vote proxies for more than two absent members.

Nominees for Election at the Annual Congregational Meeting

At the Congregational meeting June 15, 2008, members will be asked to elect individuals to several open positions at TVUUC. The Nominating Committee has the task of searching for and recommending a qualified slate of nominees for those positions. Our recommendations are included here for review in advance of the meeting. Additional nominations will be accepted from the floor at the meeting. If you are considering nominating anyone not listed here, please be sure to discuss the nomination with the potential nominee in advance of the meeting.

The Nominating Committee members are Chloe Aioldi-Watters, Bee DeSelms, Ted Jones, Tim Klein, and Elnora Williams. We met from October 2007 through April 2008 to sift through a gratifyingly large list of qualified candidates, originating in responses to an open solicitation of the entire congregation. Our goals were to match people, personalities, and skills to open positions for which TVUUC has the most need and to which they were best suited.
